The juniper problem

Did you know? Juniper trees and bushes greatly increase the fire risk of your property. Firefighters often refer to ornamental junipers as "little green gas cans". They are highly flammable and burn intensely. If you have junipers near your home, consider removing them. You can replace them with fire-wise plants, rock mulches and hard surfaces.

Firewise Demonstration Garden





October 2025 Spotlight

What does it mean to live in a fire prone ecosystem?

Montana forests experienced wildfires historically. Many forests at low elevations had frequent, low-intensity wildfires that created open forests dominated by large, widely spaced trees with grass understories. Due to factors such as fire suppression, land management practices, and climate today's forests often contain dense trees, downed fuels, and many



small trees and shrubs. As a result, fires can burn intensely. Fires behavior is determined by fuel, weather, and topography. Of these, you can only influence the fuels on your property! The objective is to treat fuels so that when a wildfire burns, it is less severe and more easily suppressed.

The Home Ignition Zone


The home ignition zone (HIZ) is the area around a house, extending out to 200 feet, where actions can be taken to reduce the risk of a wildfire igniting the home. It's a buffer zone where homeowners can create defensible space by managing vegetation and modifying the structure to make it more



fire-resistant. The HIZ has three subzones. Zone 1: 0-5 feet (lean, clean, and green!); Zone 2: 5-30 feet (reduce plant density and height); Zone 3: 100-200+ feet (thin and prune existing plants).

Fall reflections on Fuel Project Work

We've had a successful summer season at TCFSWG. Thanks to our landowner partners and contractors, we have assisted with projects on over 500 acres from 2024-2025 (to date). Each project makes the neighborhood and community safer!
